to how the Bureau classifies its institutions, and how they determine what security level facility to which each inmate will be designated to serve his/her sentence. Individual worksheets, similar to those used by BOP staff, are included to assist in determining the security level of prison to which you will be designated. There are also recommendations which may help you secure placement in a prison of your choice. Q. Does the Manual provide information about how the BOP uses the Pre-Sentence Investigation Report? A. Yes it does. The Pre-Sentence Report is utilized by the BOP from the time of initial designation and throughout an inmate's term of confinement. Because of its importance, a significant portion of the discussion in part one focuses on the Pre-Sentence Investigation and Pre-Sentence Report. Information to assist you in ensuring that your PSR contains complete accurate information is provided. Q. I was told the Bureau of Prisons has a program in place that requires inmates to pay on their court-ordered assessments, restitution, and/or fines. Does the Manual offer information about this program? A. Yes. The Bureau of Prisons has implemented the Inmate Financial Responsibility Program. The program is voluntary; however, individuals who refuse participation are prohibited from participating and receiving the benefits from other BOP programs. The Manual provides an overview of the program's policies including what obligations the BOP will attempt to collect and how payments are figured. Q. Does the Manual provide information about the Residential Drug Abuse Program (RDAP)? A. Yes. The Residential Drug Abuse Program is the only program (other than good time credit) that may reduce the amount of time you spend in a federal prison.

However, participants must meet strict criteria. Therein not all individuals are eligible to receive the reduction in their sentence for successfully completing the program. The Manual delineates the Bureau's policies surrounding the program, as well as the numerous other cognitive-based treatment programs offered within the Bureau of Prisons. Q. Does the Manual provide any information to assist those who have been convicted of sex offenses (child pornography included)? A. Yes. For safety and security reasons the Bureau of Prisons has employed policies that effect how individuals convicted of sex offenses are managed. The Manual highlights these policies and also provides an overview of treatment programs offered to sex offenders.

The Federal Prison Population Buildup Dec 24 2022 Since the early 1980s, there has been a historically unprecedented increase in the federal prison population. Some of the growth is attributable to changes in federal criminal justice policy during the previous three decades. An issue before Congress is whether policymakers consider the rate of growth in the federal prison population sustainable, and if not, what changes could be made to federal criminal justice policy to reduce the prison population while maintaining public safety. This report explores the issues related to the growing federal prison population. The number of inmates under the Bureau of Prisons' (BOP) jurisdiction has increased from approximately 25,000 in FY1980 to nearly 219,000 in FY2012. Since FY1980, the federal prison population has increased, on average, by approximately 6,100 inmates each year. Data show that a growing proportion of inmates are being incarcerated for immigration- and weapons-

related offenses, but the largest portion of newly admitted inmates are being incarcerated for drug offenses. Data also show that approximately 7 in 10 inmates are sentenced for five years or less. Changes in federal sentencing and correctional policy since the early 1980s have contributed to the rapid growth in the federal prison population. These changes include increasing the number of federal offenses subject to mandatory minimum sentences; changes to the federal criminal code that have made more crimes federal offenses; and eliminating parole. There are several issues related to the growing federal prison population that might be of interest to policymakers: The increasing number of federal inmates, combined with the rising per capita cost of incarceration, has made it increasingly more expensive to operate and maintain the federal prison system. The per capita cost of incarceration for all inmates increased from \$19,571 in FY2000 to \$26,094 in FY2011. During this same period of time, appropriations for the BOP increased from \$3.668 billion to \$6.381 billion; The federal prison system is increasingly overcrowded. Overall, the federal prison system was 39% over its rated capacity in FY2011, but high- and medium-security male facilities were operating at 51% and 55%, respectively, over rated capacity. At issue is whether overcrowding might lead to more inmate misconduct. The results of research on this topic have been mixed; The inmate-to-staff ratio has increased from 4.1 inmates per staff member in FY2000 to 4.9 inmates per staff member in FY2011. Likewise, the inmate to correctional officer ratio increased from 9.8 inmates per correctional officer in FY2000 to 10.2 inmates per correctional officer in FY2011, but this is down from a high of 10.9 inmates

per correctional officer in FY2005; The growing prison population is taking a toll on the infrastructure of the federal prison system. The BOP reports that it has a backlog of 154 modernization and repair projects with an approximate cost of \$349 million for FY2012. Past appropriations left the BOP in a position where it could expand bedspace to manage overcrowding but not reduce it. However, reductions in funding since FY2010 mean that the BOP will lack the funding to begin new prison construction in the near future. At the same time, it has become more expensive to expand the BOP's capacity. Should Congress choose to consider policy options to address the issues resulting from the growth in the federal prison population, policymakers could choose options such as increasing the capacity of the federal prison system by building more prisons, investing in rehabilitative programming, or placing more inmates in private prisons. Policymakers might also consider whether they want to revise some of the policy changes that have been made over the past three decades that have contributed to the steadily increasing number of offenders being incarcerated.

The Role of Recreational Sports in the Federal Prison System Jun 18 2022 This thesis is an exploration of the nature and consequences of recreational sports programmes in the federal prison system of Canada.

Data were collected by interviewing a convenience sample of sixteen inmates and three Corrections Officers, having informal discussions with inmates and staff, and observing recreational practices, in four male Canadian federal prisons. Four key issues were identified: the effect of participating in prison sports, the rehabilitation of the inmates and social control within the institution, the cost of implementing sports programming, and the wider issue of prisoners' rights concerning their use of recreational time. Analysis of the data shows that recreational sports programmes play an important role in the social control of male prisons. Other findings show that these programmes are beneficial to inmates during their incarceration in a number of ways. Most respondents claimed that involvement in recreational sports reduced stress and/or frustration, alleviated boredom, increased self-esteem, helped in the establishment of goals and a routine, and assisted inmates in developing friendships. Both inmate and staff concluded that prison recreational sports did not contribute to additional aggression and were essential components of the prison regime. Recreation can be seen as a fundamental component of any healthy lifestyle and, hence, it is argued that recreation opportunities should be provided for those incarcerated.

The Bureau, in its first sixty years of existence, introduced numerous correctional innovations, thereby building an effective, centrally controlled prison system with progressive standards. The Federal Bureau of Prisons was established in 1930 to provide more progressive and humane care for Federal inmates, to professionalize the prison service, and to ensure consistent and centralized administration of the 11 Federal prisons in operation at that time. Today, the Bureau includes 116 institutions, 6 regional offices, a Central Office (headquarters), and community corrections offices that oversee residential re-entry centers and home confinement programs. The regional offices and the Central Office provide administrative oversight and support to the institutions and community corrections offices. The Bureau is responsible for the custody and care of more than 209,500 Federal offenders. Approximately 82 percent of these inmates are confined in Bureau-operated correctional institutions or detention centers. The remainder is confined in secure privately managed or community-based facilities and local jails. The Bureau protects public safety by ensuring Federal offenders serve their sentences of imprisonment in institutions that are safe, humane, cost-efficient, and appropriately

secure. The Bureau helps reduce future criminal activity by encouraging inmates to participate in a range of programs that have been proven to help them adopt a crime-free lifestyle upon their return to the community. The Bureau's most important resource is its staff. The more than 38,500 employees of the Bureau of Prisons ensure the security of Federal prisons, provide inmates with needed programs and services, and model mainstream values. The Bureau's employees help the agency meet its obligation to protect public safety and provide security and safety to the staff and inmates in its facilities.
